About the Course

This course is designed for **first-time readers of Homer**.

No prior knowledge of *The Iliad*, Greek mythology, or ancient history is required. Kirk's new translation of *The Iliad* will be provided as part of the course. In both print and ebook format.

Readers who have encountered Homer before—whether in school, on their own, or elsewhere—will come away with an understanding of the epic that **very few readers today ever achieve**.

After years of studying, teaching, and translating *The Iliad*, Kirk Barbera has developed a distinctive way of approaching the poem: not as an academic artifact, but as a living work that shaped, and still shapes, how human beings understand honor, excellence, competition, individuality, and meaning.

What You'll Learn

Beyond understanding the story itself, participants will explore questions that lie at the heart of Western civilization:

What is a hero?

And why did the Greeks become obsessed with discovering *the best*—an obsession that gave rise to the Olympic Games and competitive excellence as a cultural ideal.

Who is the greatest Greek hero?
 Achilles, the mightiest warrior? Or Odysseus, the trickster hero?

- How does Homer invent a storytelling form that still governs narrative today? From epic conflict and character arcs to moral tension and psychological depth, the *lliad* establishes patterns that persist in literature, film, and modern storytelling.
- Where do we first see the roots of individualism?
 Discover how Homer takes traditional folk heroes and transforms them into unique characters with never before projected traits.
- How did the Greeks grapple with fate and free will?
 The *Iliad* presents a world governed by destiny—yet filled with choice, responsibility, and consequence.

Throughout the course, Kirk connects Homer's epic to **our own ways of understanding the human world today**—from modern ideas of success and competition, to leadership, rage, grief, mercy, and what it means to live a meaningful life.

This course will be followed by an Odyssey course. All will be completed before July 17th, 2026, when Christopher Nolan's The Odyssey will be released in theaters. Participants of either the lliad course or the Odyssey course (ideally both) will enter that theater knowledgeable about all the important elements of Greek literature and the specialness of these epic tales.
